To take place.

How did this incident come about?

Come down:

To be reduced

The prices of cotton nave come down.

Come of:

To descend from

He comes of a noble family.

Come off:

to take place

When does your marriage come off.

Come by:

To acquire

How did you come by this watch?

Come round:

To recover

It is hoped that he will come round soon.

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Phrasal verbs

Come out:

to become public, to appear Several new books have come out this year.

Come out of:

To get clear of He came out of all hardships.

Come on:

To grow or thrive The plants are coming on very soon.

Come over:

To come into one's mind A great longing came over me to see her again.

Come to


To arrive at the result They came to a wise decision in the long run.

Come up to:

To be equal to

He did not come up to the expectation of his father.

Come up:

To be raised you

The question of co-education came up in the meeting.

Come up with:

To overtake

A man on a cycle can come up with a traveler in a Tonga.

Come at:

To get within reach of, to attain
I saw the fruit on the tree but it was too high for me to
come at.

Come away:

The handle of the door came away.

Come upon:

Meet with accident
He came upon the news of his success in the
newspaper.

Come in for:

To be an heir

He came in for a good deal of property after the death of his uncle.

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
