Freaking Out (Meanings) Not quite panicking

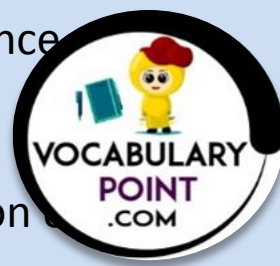
Flutter (Meanings) To bet or place a wager.
